No Crying He Makes???

any people are saying or thinking that the best thing about the year 2020 is that it is almost over. If this year made you want to cry or if it did in fact make you cry, consider the words of the beloved Christmas Carol, "Away in the Manger" which tells us that the little Lord Jesus, "No crying he makes." Go to manger scenes around the country and you would be hard pressed to find a crying Jesus. Of course, that is because most churches use plastic dolls for Jesus in our manger

Because we have sung it over and over we tend to think of the baby Jesus not letting a tear roll down his cheeks on that evening in Bethlehem. Yet the words of the Scripture make it very clear that Jesus was just like us in fact the Bible tells us that Jesus was fully human so that He could make atonement for the sins of people.

Hebrews 12:16-18 For surely it is not angels he helps, but Abraham's descendants. ¹⁷For this reason he had to be made like them, fully human in every way, in order that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in service to God, and that he might make atonement for the sins of the people. ¹⁸Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted.

If Jesus was just like us did He cry on the first Christmas night? I don't think we'll ever know for sure but the author of Hebrews does tell us that Jesus did in fact cry. Hebrews 5:7 says, "Who, in the days of His flesh, when He had offered up prayers and supplications, with vehement cries and tears to Him who was able to save Him from death, and was heard because of His godly fear." Yes Jesus cried, in fact the shortest verse of the Bible is generally believed to be simply, "Jesus wept."

What is it that brought the savior of the world to tears? Primarily, it was us—the people who Jesus came to save. There are three specific places in Scripture in which Jesus feels the same anguish of emotion that we often feel.

When Jesus saw his friend Mary weeping at the death of her brother Lazarus, He also wept before ultimately raising Lazarus from the dead. Jesus feels our hurts because he did become fully human to save

Jesus wept when He saw man's rejection of God's plan. Luke 19:41-42 says, "As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it and said, "If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace--but now it is hidden from your eyes." As a loving Father, God hates to see us turn away from Him but is always willing to welcome us back with open arms.

Finally, Jesus experienced anguish when He was confronted with the price of our salvation. As he prayed in Gethsemane Luke 22:41, "He withdrew about a stone's throw beyond them, knelt down and prayed, 'Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done.' An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him. And being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground." Facing the cost of saving us from our sins, Jesus had arguably the most intense moment anyone ever had in all of history.

I don't know if Jesus cried in the manger, but I do know that he cried. He cried about us. He hurts when we hurt. He hurts when we reject God's path and go our own way and he weeps over sin.

If 2020 brought a tear to your eye remember that you are in good company.

Lingering Effects of Imprisonment

key denominational leader targeted by Communist separatists in Myanmar continues to suffer lasting effects from his imprisonment. In 2018, the Wa State Army arrested Christians and at least 120 pastors in northeastern Myanmar, including Aikhun Plot. In prison, he spent most of his time with a metal leg chain digging into his ankle, causing long-term bone damage and pain, and he also contracted a skin disease. Upon his release and after treatment, his skin ailment cleared up, but he continues to experience excruciating pain in his leg as doctors have not been

able to provide effective treatment. The pastor was recently elected principal of a Bible college and is eager to take on his new responsibilities. "Pray for God's wisdom and guidance for him and his family so he would be able to preside and lead the college effectively for the glory of God and his kingdom expansion," wrote a VOM worker in Myanmar.

CHOOL FORCES 9-YEAR-OLD GIRL TO REMOVE 'JESUS LOVES ME' MASK.
PARENTS FILE FEDERAL LAWSUIT

In early October, a nine-year-old Christian Mississippi girl who wore a "Jesus Loves Me" mask to school was forced to remove it and replace it with one the school approved.

On Monday, her parents, Matthew and Jennifer Booth, filed a <u>federal lawsuit</u> alleging religious discrimination.

The lawsuit notes that the "Jesus Loves Me"

mask caused no disruptions, upset no students, and no student objected to its message. The complaint also notes that the "defendants regularly permit (the student's) schoolmates to wear masks, with messages on them. Following are just a few examples of the messages and designs Plaintiff

and her parents have observed on other students' and faculty's masks: Jackson State University logo; New Orleans Saints logo; 'Black Lives Matter.'"

The Alliance Defending Freedom is representing Lydia and her family. ADF legal counsel Michael Ross <u>stated</u>:

Public schools have a duty to respect the free expression of students that the First Amendment guarantees to them. While school administrators face challenges in helping students navigate school life during a pandemic, those officials simply can't suspend the First Amendment or arbitrarily pick and

choose the messages that students can or can't express. Other students within the school district have freely worn masks with the logos of local sports teams or even the words 'Black Lives Matter.' This student deserves an equal opportunity to peacefully express her beliefs.

The lawsuit asserts that unable to find such a reference, Jennifer then posted on Facebook that Lydia would wear the mask again on October 13. That morning, the school's principal contacted Jennifer Booth and said that Lydia's mask violated the school's dress code, according to the lawsuit. The code prohibits "clothing, advertising, alcoholic bev-

erages or drug culture, clothing with obscene language or gestures or clothing of any suggestive nature."

The principal of the school poked her head into the classroom and winked at Lydia, and then the teacher's assistant asked Lydia to change her mask before lunch so that no one saw her. Lydia then replaced the mask with one with a

panda on it, the lawsuit claims.

The same afternoon, Jennifer Booth emailed the superintendent of the district and the principal, stating, "I am requesting my child return to wearing her mask TODAY and have an apology to her from the school district." The lawsuit states that when she was picked up from school, Lydia was upset because she could not wear her "Jesus Loves Me" mask to school.
